

Audition Information

Attire

Theatre auditions are different from music auditions. At a theatre audition, you want to show us your range as an actor so that we can imagine you in as many roles as possible. At the same time, you want to be comfortable moving and singing as well as feeling like the best version of yourself. Here are some broad ideas that might help guide your decision. If in doubt, please reach out!

Yes: Clean clothes that are free of stains and noticeable wrinkles. Jeans, flannel shirts, sun dresses, heels, tennis shoes are all welcome as long as they help us notice YOU and not THEM.

No: Sweat pants or sweat shirts, flip flops, polarizing graphics (featuring politics, obscene language, etc.)

Singing and Acting Audition

Prepare two musical theatre songs of contrasting styles (classic vs. contemporary Broadway, or upbeat vs. ballad) and a one-minute monologue from published musicals and plays. Songs and monologues should be from shows and characters that are age and type-appropriate for the auditionee. All students should provide a resume listing previous productions and training. The acting audition will take place separately from the singing audition.



Dance Audition

Prior to the audition:

• Please watch and learn this combination on your own: https://youtu.be/mxb9PljQPv8

We are not looking for perfection - We will answer any questions you have about the combination on the day of your audition.

- Arrive wearing appropriate dance clothes (i.e. jazz pants, leggings, leotards, tights) with your hair pulled back and out of your face.
- Bring dance shoes if you have them (jazz, ballet, or character shoes). If you don't own dance shoes, please wear tennis shoes/sneakers that you can easily move in. During the audition:
- We will begin with a group warm-up, then short combinations across the floor. We will review the combo and learn the ending before performing.



The BM in Musical Theatre is designed for students who want to pursue skills in the areas of music directing, accompaniment and composition. This rigorous degree program will prepare students to become a musical theatre musician by training them in music theory, piano and conducting as well as giving them exposure to acting, dancing, and theatrical technology. Because students have a comprehensive understanding of theatre production by the time they graduate, they are better able to collaborate with the production team as well as write for the stage.

While at MBU, BM in Musical Theatre students will be immersed in a comprehensive music program, participating in multiple productions as actors, musicians, and assistant music directors, actively pursuing excellence as members of the MBU Chorale or

Concert Band, and devoting several hours per week to individual rehearsal time. Our desire is for you to learn the time management skills and develop the grit that is necessary to excel in your chosen career.

Audition Information

Attire

A music audition tends to be more formal than a theatre audition. In music, the most important part of the performance is the voice or instrument. Dress code is more strictly enforced in these spaces so that what you are wearing does not detract from the music.

Yes: Clean clothes that are free of stains and noticeable wrinkles. Dress pants, skirts, blouses, button downs, and polos are all examples of acceptable attire. No: Sweat pants or sweat shirts, flip flops, polarizing graphics (featuring politics, obscene language, etc.)

Singing Audition

Prepare two musical theatre songs of contrasting styles (classic vs. contemporary Broadway, or upbeat vs. ballad). Songs should be from shows and characters that are age and type-appropriate for the auditionee. All students should provide a resume listing previous productions and training.

At this time it is appropriate and encouraged for you to prepare a piece for piano if you have had piano training. Piano is a vital skill that will be developed during your time at MBU. If you have had training it is helpful for us to know where to place you in your private lessons.

Attire

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Acting Audition

Prepare two monologues (at least one-minute per monologue) that represent contrasting styles or periods (classic vs. contemporary, comedic vs. dramatic). Monologues must come from published plays. Students with a background in technical theatre (such as directing or set, lighting and costume design) should provide a portfolio with examples of their work. All students should provide a resume listing previous productions and training. Students who wish to also minor in Dance may be asked to attend a dance audition to determine appropriate placement in dance class sections.




BA/BS Speech/Theatre Education

The BA/BS in Speech/Theatre Education is designed for students who want to teach at the secondary level.

Students work alongside our theatre majors on mainstage productions: performing, designing and directing. You do not have to audition into the program, but you may audition in order to obtain a scholarship.

While at MBU, Speech/Theatre Education students should expect to participate in multiple productions as well as devote several hours per week to individual rehearsal time and skills practice. In addition, education students must meet all the rigorous requirements of our School of Education.

Prepare any two of the following options: monologue (may elect to do two monologues), musical theatre song, or portfolio/tech interview. Monologues should come from published works. If possible, students should provide a theatrical resume.



Special Circumstances

Video Auditions

We believe that theatre should be accessible to all, and that includes making sure that if you want to be seen for an audition regardless of your ability to travel to us, we will make sure that happens for you!

You may submit a video audition including all of the material required for your particular degree program. If you do not have an accompanist, please use a karaoke track with your audition. Please submit the dance combo in the YouTube link above and include any other skills (tap, tumbling, etc.) that you believe relevant. If we need to see more from you, we will send an additional combination.

The video should be uploaded to YouTube or a similar site, and the link sent via email along with headshot and resumé to kasey.cox@mobap.edu. Your video should be a full-body shot, lit well, and able to be clearly heard. Please slate your name, the title of the songs and the musical from which they are taken, and the title of the play and the author from which your monologue is taken.
